







Average Positive Responses*


Year-to-Year Growth: Following the Same Students

School Goals


By 2015-2016, we expect 80% of our 5th grade students will read, write and do math at standard as measured by the Washington Assessment of Student Learning. The quality of intentional planning based on standards, frequent assessments and ongoing collaborate are essential to ensure this growth. Along with this we must have strong students teacher relationships coupled with consistent communication with families.

School Description & Plan to Achieve Goals

B.F. Day is a welcoming diverse community school. It is the oldest continually operating school in the district. We have been promoting students on since 1892. We strive to provide a quality education to each student. As we strive for 80% of our 5th grade students to standard in Math we need to continue to move our level 1 and level 2 students towards mastery. There has been much growth as you look at this cohort of students in 2011-2012 performing at 44% mastery and in 2012-2013 performing at 63% mastery. During the 2012-2013 school year, strategic interventions were put in place. By using the B.F. Day Intervention system we targeted interventions towards specific students in very controlled curricular environments to supplement their math instruction. As we continue this work, we aim for this cohort of students to achieve at least 75% mastery in Math in the 2013-2014 school year. This intervention system is used at all grade levels and in all subject areas. Looking at multiple data points we are able to identify students who are not on track to making at least a years growth in a years time. This approach is also reflected through the principal and teacher’s individual professional goals. Teachers look closely at each and every student, assessing what supports they need to make at least a years growth in a year’s time. The principal then works with teachers at each grade level to support these goals.
