







Average Positive Responses*


Year-to-Year Growth: Following the Same Students

School Goals


One of our goals is for students in grades 3, 4 and 5 to meet Annual Measurement Objective (AMO) targets established by the state in reading and math. Therefore we want to provide students in grades K-2 with the academic skills to be successful at the intermediate level. School wide curriculum alignment with the Common Core Standards (CCSS) is a key focus for our staff. MAP results have been proven to be an accurate measure of student success on the state Measurement of Student Progress (MSP). Therefore, one of our goals is to supersede national standards in the percentage of students meeting typical growth targets in reading and math.

School Description & Plan to Achieve Goals

When reviewing summative and formative data, our efforts to provide supplemental activities, workshop strategies and additional classroom support helped our students progress in math and reading. An ongoing challenge has been to close the achievement gap for students facing socio-economic issues and those that have special needs. However, we have made progress in this area. It is worth noting that we received the state School of Distinction award in 2012, 2013 and 2014 for being in the top 5% of Washington schools for high progress in reading and math. Over the past several years we have increased the overall achievement of students facing socio-economic challenges as well as students with special needs. Reading and math readiness, readers, writer's and math workshop strategies, resource allocation for additional classroom support and schoolwide academic events such as school wide writing and science celebrations will better facilitate students overall achievement.
