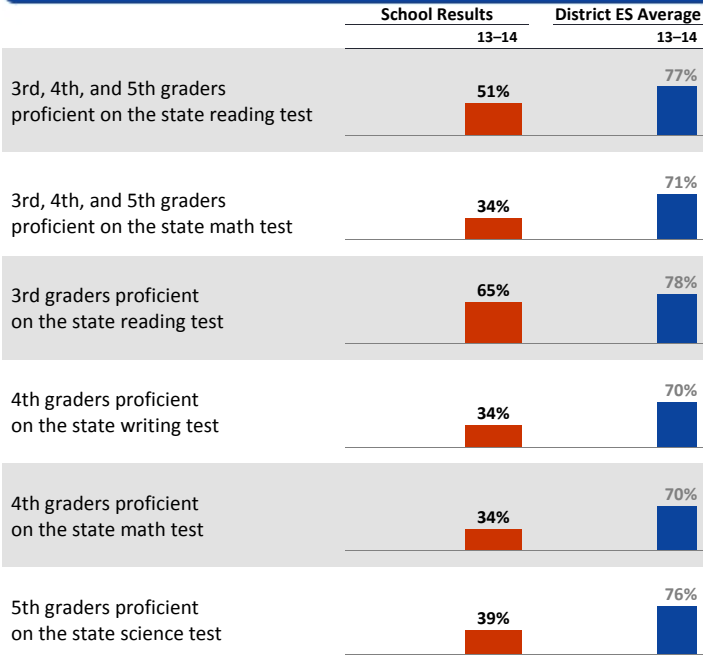

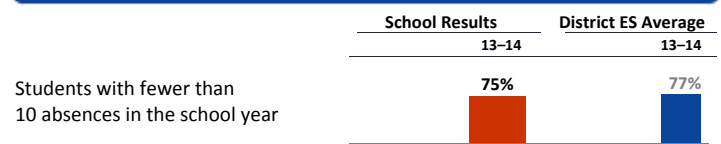

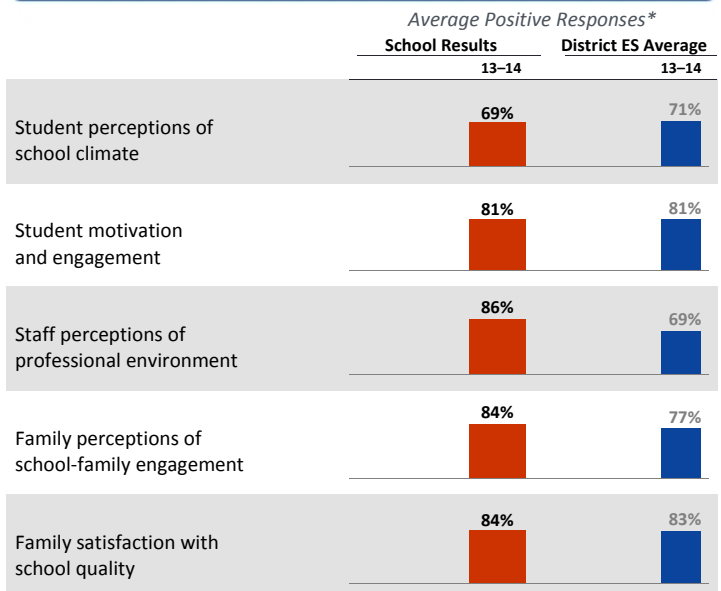

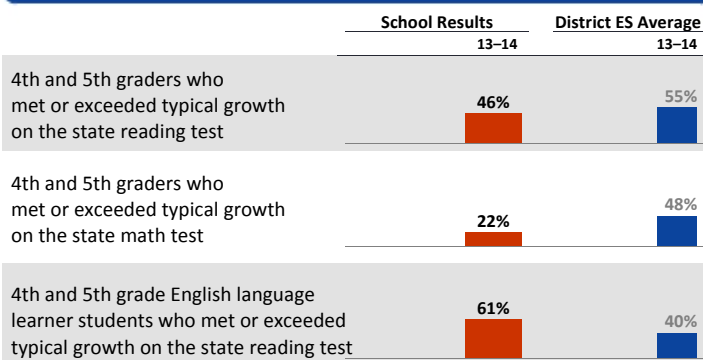

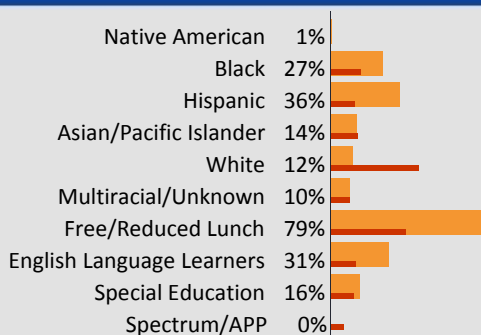
Year-to-Year Growth: Following the Same Students

School Mission Statement

Roxhill Elementary, a full service community school, fosters a climate of compassion, academic excellence, problem solving, creativity, and cultural awareness where the school, families, and the community are working together for the social, emotional, physical, and intellectual development of each child.

School Goals

- 65% of 3rd- 5th grade students will be proficient on the Math MSP test in May 2013.
- 70 % of 4th- 5th grade students will be proficient on the Reading MSP test in May 2013.
- 60% of ELL students meet or exceed typical growth on the MAP reading assessment in Spring 2013.
- 75% of our K-5th grade students will have fewer than 5 absences (excused or unexcused) in the first trimester and second trimester.

School Description & Plan to Achieve Goals

During the 2012-13 school year, in collaboration with staff and families, we became a full service community school. A full service community school is both a place and a set of partnerships between the school and other community resources. Its integrated focus on academics, health and social services, youth and community development and community engagement leads to improved student learning, stronger families and healthier communities. This is not a program, but rather a collaborative approach to supporting student success. It is not just a set of services, but rather, a different way of doing business, one in which all stakeholders are in authentic relationships and have a shared vision for success. At Roxhill, we have the Families and Education Levy and Collaborative Schools for Innovation and Success Grant. These opportunities enable us to work in partnership with the University of Washington, Communities in Schools, City Year, Neighborcare and other community partners to provide comprehensive, wrap-around support for our students and families.

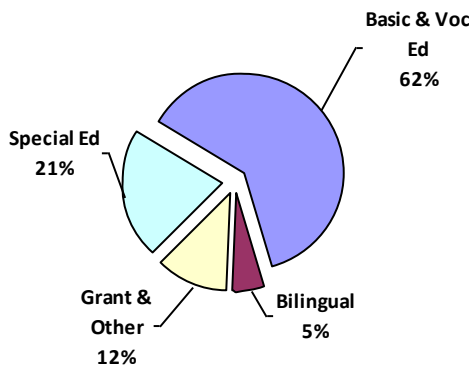
READING & WRITING: Implementation of Readers and Writers Workshop aligned to CCSS.

MATH: With support from UW, teachers participate in job-embedded professional development (Math Labs) to elicit and respond to students’ mathematical contributions toward deep conceptual understanding and orienting students to one another’s ideas through number talks and discussion.

EXTENDED LEARNING: Team Read, City Year before/after school programs, SCORES, Math AllStars, Invest in Youth, UTSS, and Saturday Academy.
