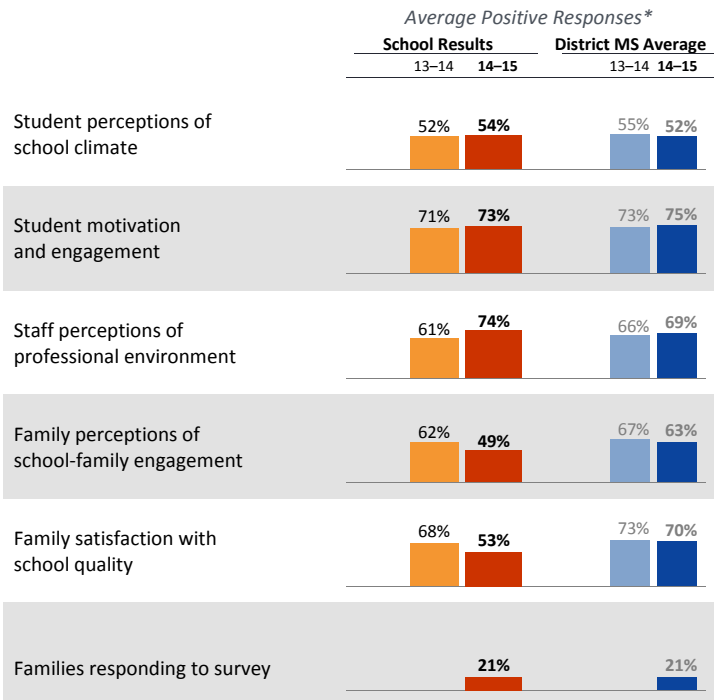

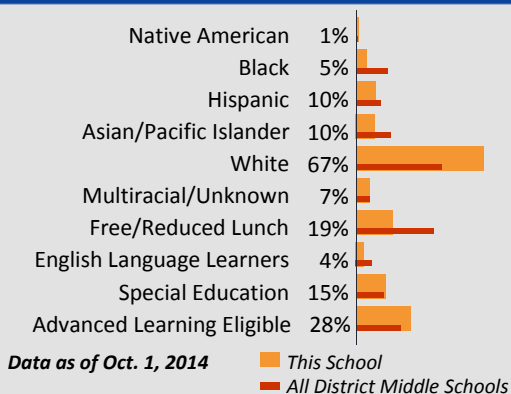

School Goals

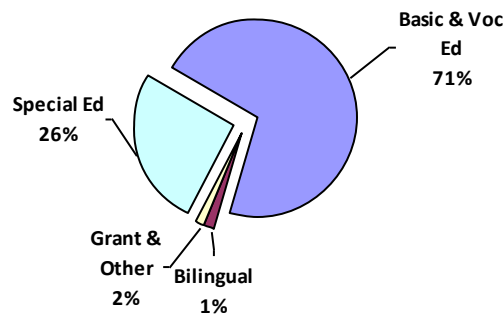
All students, including those in Math and ELA students who perform at a Level 1 or 2 on the most recent state test (Smarter Balance) will accomplish typical growth or better on this year's state test.

School Description & Plan to Achieve Goals

As a whole staff, at Department meetings in our Professional Learning Communities and in our Building Leadership Team that includes parents and community, we analyze student achievement data and develop data-based SMART goals for student growth in all major goal areas. We also look closely at student climate data to address gaps in students' self-assessment of how McClure supports their academic achievement and social/behavioral health and growth. All teachers at McClure use differentiation strategies to effectively accelerate students who struggle with content and skills and to provide enrichment and application opportunities for students who have already mastered a particular standard or skill. Teachers at McClure engage in ongoing book studies, professional development and collaboration that help bolster their expertise with effective differentiation. Departments and PLCs also intentionally develop aligned lesson plans that mandate strategies for differentiation. We use data to inform and to guide our instruction, use of time, use of materials, and intervention strategies for each student.
