School board seeks public input on superintendent search

Community meetings scheduled for Jan. 16, 17, 18

The Seattle School Board will hold a series of meetings on Jan. 16, 17, and 18 to gather public input on the superintendent search process. Specifically, community members will be asked to discuss the characteristics and qualities they want in Seattle Public Schools' next superintendent. These meetings will provide the board, and the consulting firm assisting in the search, with information they will use in recruiting candidates for the next leader for Seattle Public Schools.

A series of eight open community meetings are planned Jan. 16-18. In addition, the consultants will meet with representatives of community associations and organizations; school employees; school leaders; and the district's senior leadership team. The meeting scheduled only for employees is at 4:15 p.m., Jan. 16 at the Mercer Middle School lunchroom. Employees may also attend any general meeting. Bond and levy propositions scheduled for Feb. 6 special election

King County Elections has scheduled two Seattle School District ballot measures for the Feb. 6, 2007, special election – Proposition 1, a \$490 million Capital Program Bond, and Proposition 2, a \$397 million Educational Programs and Operations Levy.

The Capital Program Bond replaces an expiring capital levy and provides funds for the design, construction, and renovation of school facilities, infrastructure and technology improvements throughout the district. The measure includes a program to renovate or replace four high schools, two middle schools, and one K-8 school.

The Educational Programs and Operations Levy, which replaces the expiring 2004 levy, represents 24 percent of the district's annual general fund budget and supports basic educational services not fully funded by the state. The levy will help pay for instructional programs, technology support, student activities, staff salaries, bilingual and special-education services, continuation of full-day kindergarten, student transportation, and security and maintenance for school buildings and grounds.

School board adopts conservation policy

District’s goal to reduce natural resource consumption by 5 percent

The school board has realized the district’s significant impact on the environment and adopted a Natural Resource Conservation Policy last month with a district goal to reduce natural resource consumption by 5 percent.

The district requests that everyone help by:

- turning off lights in unoccupied rooms and switching off the row of lights along the windows on sunny days.
- wearing a sweater and some warm socks. Most people are able to be comfortable within a range of temperatures, once their body has had time to acclimate. The district’s standard of heating is 68 degrees and 76 degrees for cooling. By dressing with an extra layer of clothing you should be able to stay warm and help the environment.
- making sure monitors, printers, and other electrical equipment are turned off when not in use.
- shutting curtains or blinds and making sure all outside doors are kept closed during the winter.
- actively recycling and using the double-side feature when printing and copying.

Seattle Public Schools issues Annual Asbestos Notification

In accordance with the federal Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), Seattle Public Schools is required to notify parents, teachers, and other employees each year of the availability of Asbestos Management Plans and actions the district is taking to maintain asbestos containing materials in its buildings.

The district conducted an initial inspection of all school buildings to identify asbestos containing building material in 1988. A management plan detailing the findings of the inspection was developed for each building. Since then, appropriate actions have been taken to ensure that asbestos containing materials are removed, repaired, encapsulated, or enclosed as necessary.

A periodic surveillance of each school building has occurred every six months since the original inspection and a complete reinspection of each school building is completed every three years. The next reinspection is scheduled for this summer.

The Asbestos Management Plan includes the results of each periodic surveillance and the most recent reinspection, as well as documentation of asbestos-related activities. The Asbestos Management Plan is maintained and available for review in the administrative office of each school or at the John Stanford Center for Educational Excellence at 2445 3rd Ave S.

On-time open enrollment for 2007-08 begins Jan. 16

On-time open enrollment in Seattle Public Schools for the 2007-2008 school year is scheduled from Jan. 16 to Feb. 28.

This is the time when families register and apply for school for:

- children entering kindergarten in September 2007;
- students advancing from elementary to middle school or middle to high school next year;
- students wishing to change schools; or
- students who will be new to the district in September.

Students who apply during the open enrollment period receive priority assignment for September 2007. Assignment letters will be mailed out the first week in April 2007.

SPS-TV rebroadcasts award-winning safety videos

Parents, caregivers and the community have further opportunities to watch two videos now airing on Seattle Public Schools Television regarding school safety and sexual abuse. The first video outlines plans and programs the school district has in place to manage emergencies; the second video presents guidelines for parents and caregivers to help them protect children from sexual abuse.

The first video, *Your Child's Safety at School*, is produced by the district's Safety and Security Department. The video provides practical advice on how the district and community can work together to create a safe and secure environment for all students and provide for the best possible outcome in any emergency. It is the recipient of numerous awards, including: The Telly Award, Aegis Award, and Davey Award.

The 30-minute video airs from now to March 15 at 7:30 a.m. Tuesdays, 9:30 p.m. Thursdays, 8 p.m. Saturdays, and 8 a.m. Sundays.

The second video, *What Do I Say Now?* produced by the Committee for Children, offers information about sexual abuse, guidelines for providing a safe and caring environment for young children, practical examples showing how and when to talk to children about safety and touching, and guidelines for responding to a child who discloses abuse.

The 30-minute video airs from Feb. 15 to March 15 at 10 p.m., Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Symetra Heroes in the Classroom project raises \$48,150

24 teachers honored; funds help provide schools with books and supplies

The Seattle Seahawks, Symetra Financial and Vulcan Inc., sponsors of the *Symetra Heroes in the Classroom* project, presented a \$48,150 check to Seattle Public Schools during an on-field presentation Dec. 24 at Qwest Field.
