Principal's Message

Marni Campbell, Nathan Hale Principal

April's Coalition of Essential Schools common principle: *The principal and teachers should perceive themselves as generalists first (teachers and scholars in general education) and specialists second (experts in but one particular discipline). Staff should expect multiple obligations (teacher-counselor-manager) and a sense of commitment to the entire school.*

Each Wednesday and Thursday morning at 10 o'clock I meet with my 9th grade mentorship class. We listen to the announcements and learn about the many activities and events in our busy community. I ask them to share pertinent details from what they've heard, and we talk about issues and opportunities, clubs and sports, projects and weekend plans.

Next, we check grades together. We review missing assignments, look up science articles, complete math and health assignments, and celebrate completed projects. We have "book talks" to document their independent reading (see www.seattleschools.org/schools/hale/outside_reading/ for information about the Raider Reading Requirement). Sometimes we make pancakes. Sometimes we just hang out. It's always the highlight of my week.

Mentorship is a critical part of our work as educators at Nathan Hale. One-on-one mentoring is the work of every adult in our school because we are committed to the principle, as stated above, that we are "generalists" first and "specialists" second. That is, we teach students, not subjects.

Of course, we hold ourselves to high expectations as scholars, and immerse ourselves deeply in our disciplines. But without the ability to build relationships and to provide relevant learning opportunities, we cannot be effective teachers of any subject.

Nathan Hale is a school where all adults see themselves as teachers, mentors, counselors, and genuine caretakers for students. If you tour our hallways at lunchtime, for example, you will find that most teachers are in their rooms with their doors open, eating and visiting with students, hosting club meetings, or helping with homework. This is just one example of the culture of "commitment to the entire school" at Hale.

With the arrival of Spring, we have many opportunities for you to become one of the "generalists" at our school by celebrating student accomplishments in athletics, drama, music, art, and musical theatre. * **Please note that Tuesday, May 13th is the presentation night for Senior Culminating Projects. If you are willing to be on a panel that watches and evaluates a Culminating Project presentation, please e-mail me at macampbell@seattleschools.org.** Thank you for being a part of our community!

The CES principle - commitment to the entire school – that's a tall order for staff and for families! Just as it's easy to see how a teacher can be totally immersed in their chosen discipline, it's understandable that families are totally wrapped up in their own student or students. There is so much to keep on top of – school work, extra-curricular activities, jobs, social time and family time (when at all possible!). Who has time and energy to commit to the entire school? Well, just as it's wonderful to have Nathan Hale staff make this commitment, it's great that many Nathan Hale families also make commitments to the entire NH community, creating a richer experience for all our students.

Sometimes, commitment to the entire school is an extension of being involved with our own student. Greetings from your School Counseling Department! *Megan Reibel, Counseling Dept.*

As the year continues to fly by, we would like to update you with the following information and reminders.

• **Graduation is right around the corner!** The ceremony is Friday, June 13, 2008, and will begin at 6:30pm. Seniors preparing to take part in this momentous occasion should have the following items taken care of no later than May 30th:

- PE Waivers
- Online course work for credit retrieval
- Fines
- Service Learning Hours

The earlier students can complete these lingering forms and paperwork, the less there will be to worry about as graduation approaches - *waiting till the last minute is not advised*. Seniors should contact their counselor for questions about graduation status, Ms. Littlefield regarding community service, and/or Ms. Ask for book, activity, or sport fines. PE waiver forms are available in the counseling office. *Students who fail to meet these deadlines and/or complete all requirements for graduation will NOT be allowed to participate in the graduation ceremony.*

Culminating projects are also required of the Class of 2008. Please refer to the culminating project website for the most recent updates -

• With April comes our second round of **WASL testing**. 10th grade students will be taking their Math and Science tests April 15th - 18th. All 10th graders, and students who have not passed these sections in the past, need to be present during testing days. Families please try your best not to schedule vacations or appointments during this time as WASL make up will not be offered until August.

• **Sophomore** families should also be aware of the following **testing information**. As juniors, students will take the PSAT, a practice test for the SAT, in October. They will also begin taking the SAT and/or Advanced Placement (AP) exams in the spring. If you feel that your students qualifies for **special accommodations** on these tests, please contact Kate Reynolds as soon as possible. It is important that a College Board Student Eligibility Form be filled out and submitted by June 1.

A student's receipt of accommodations in school is not automatically honored by the College Board for accommodations on College Board tests (PSAT, SAT & AP tests). An Eligibility Form must be filled out and submitted at least seven weeks in advance of testing for review. Students do not have to have an IEP or 504 plan to apply for accommodations, however, specific documentation does need to be submitted in all cases. Once a student has been granted accommodations by the College Board, they are eligible to receive these on all future College Board tests, as long as the need continues to exist. Please contact Kate Reynolds with any questions and to obtain a Student Eligibility Form (which are available in the counseling office). For more information about accommodations and documentation of eligibility, please refer to <http://www.collegeboard.com/ssd/student/>.

*Please note, the process for requesting accommodations for the ACT is similar to that of the College Board. Students do not usually take the ACT until later in their junior year or early their senior year. Therefore, it is not essential that the request for accommodations be submitted as early as this spring. More information about accommodations for the ACT can be found at:
