Presentation by Dr. Vern Cherewatenko

Everyone knows how important our brain is for everyday functioning. What happens when some parts of the brain are under-functioning or over excitable? What happens when a brain is diagnosed with ADD/ADHD or other medical conditions? What do you do and where can you find resources?

The Pathfinder PTSA is fortunate to host Dr. Vern S. Cherewatenko, M.D., M.Ed. and a local University of Washington graduate from the School of Medicine to discuss some of those questions.

Dr. Cherewatenko is the Director of Functional Medicine at the Amen Clinic, Northwest in Tacoma, Washington where he evaluates, interprets, and then recommends a comprehensive treatment program relating to each patient's history and Brain SPECT findings. He specializes in patients with attention issues including ADD and ADHD, obsessional and compulsive concerns, chronic stress and fatigue, anxiety, depression, cognitive decline and other combined physical and psychological related issues. His local training and extensive clinical experience (20 years) as a Family Medicine Physician give him a wise and unique perspective relating to multi-faceted health concerns. His Master's Degree of Education in Counseling Psychology and a B.S. in Psychology further support his understanding of brain related issues.

In addition, Dr. Vern has been the featured article on the cover of *US News and World Report* as a national icon for innovative wellness medical programs. He has appeared on numerous national media outlets including: ABC Nightly News with Peter Jennings, NBC World News Tonight with Tom Brokaw, CNN National News, FOX National News, Trinity Broadcast Network (National) and their various local affiliates. He is the author of two books about health and numerous articles for *Forbes*, *Ama News*, *The Wall Street Journal* and others. He continues to educate thousands via live educational seminars and has been a guest on national radio programs.

Dr. Cherewatenko has made this generous offer to speak to parents and interested parties out of the kindness of his heart.

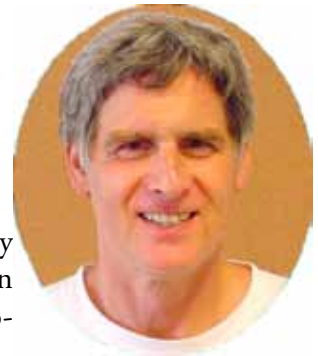

WASL

Dear Pathfinder Families,

The Washington Assessment of Student Learning, known as the WASL will begin the week after we return from Spring Break. The WASL is used to measure how well students have mastered state learning requirements in reading, writing, mathematics, and science. These learning requirements, called Essential Academic Learning Requirements or EALR's, are based on four state goals. The four goals and the EALR's explain what students should know and be able to do. The WASL is certainly not the only measure used to monitor student progress, knowledge and skills, but as we are all aware, at this time the WASL is very important.



There are a few things we need each Pathfinder family to concentrate on to help their student be as successful with the WASL as possible.

- ◆ Make sure that your student is rested and ready to take the test. Please make sure that your student goes to bed on time (or early) and does not have too many activities during WASL time.
- ◆ Your child **must be on time** for school. Students who arrive late will not be able to take the test with their classmates. Late arrivals will be too disruptive to other students. Late students will be checked into the office and will be placed in a classroom that is not testing.
- ◆ We are asking parents to provide nutritious snacks during WASL time. Please send in a note if you are able to provide whole class snacks while students are taking the WASL. We are looking for snacks that are more protein based and should include fruits and vegetables. Classrooms typically have crackers and snacks like that. We are hoping to have snacks such as cheese, yogurt, etc...

The following is a list of dates and further WASL information that you need to know.

- ◆ Third Grade students will test for four days starting on April 20th and ending on April 24th. Third Grade students will take Reading and Math tests.
- ◆ Fourth and Fifth Grade students will test for eight days starting on April 14th and primarily ending on April 23rd. There will be no testing on Wednesday, April 15th. and Wednesday, April 22nd. Fourth Grade students will take Reading, Writing, and Math tests. Fifth Grade students will take Reading, Math, and Science tests.
- ◆ Middle School students will test for seven days starting on April 14th and ending on April 21st. Sixth Grade students take Reading and Math tests beginning April 14th and ending April 17th.. Seventh Grade students take Reading, Writing, and Math tests. Eighth Grade students take Reading, Math, and Science tests.

If I can answer any questions or you have any questions related to your student taking the WASL please do not hesitate to call me at 252-9710. Thank you for joining with us as prepare our students for taking the WASL
