#### Agenda and Discussion Summary:

#### 1. Educational Specifications

- a. There was a discussion of the ways to adapt the elementary educational specification to create a site specific ed spec that serves Sacajawea Elementary's unique educational needs.
  - i. Lots of resource / space in the general ed classrooms for tutors and IA office space.
  - ii. Current model is to push-in as much as possible.
  - iii. Currently have two caseloads of Extended Resource (2) ½ classrooms and (1) full classroom.
  - iv. Resource (1) full classrooms
  - v. Reading specialist 1 office space or workroom.
  - vi. ELL push in and pull out (currently serving about 25 students. Pull out is typically for assessment.
  - vii. Distinct 1 teacher, 2-3 IAs, 7-8 students. Change 1 flex classroom to a distinct classroom.
  - viii. Extended Resource (2) ½ size classrooms
  - ix. OT/PT (1) full sized classrooms.



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x. Early learning needs (2) classrooms plus (1) classroom for developmental preschool.

#### 2. Discussion of Schemes

- a. Little Bend
  - i. Positive
    - 1. Like the front door on 20<sup>th</sup> Ave
    - 2. Clear diagram easy to understand and clear organization
    - 3. Appears to have the most playground area.
    - 4. Nice entry sequence
    - 5. Love the shape. It seems to preserve the spirit of the existing building.
  - ii. Negative
    - 1. Entry is the closest to 20<sup>th</sup> Ave so the building will appear closer to the neighbors to the North.
    - 2. Improve visual surveillance between classrooms and the learning commons.
    - 3. Need more shared space/open space in general.
    - 4. The floor plan looks a little monolithic.

#### b. Central Stair

- i. Positive
  - 1. Like the library breezeway similar to Wing Luke
  - 2. Central stair helps ease the pick-up and drop-off
  - 3. Safe, easy, and clear
  - 4. Delineation of pods and common learning space per pod.
  - 5. Level 3 is set back and less imposing from the street side of the building.
- ii. Negative
  - 1. Change to just a ramp instead of a stair through the middle of the building.
  - 2. Concerns about accessibility of the central stair.
  - 3. The continuity of the stairs at the 3<sup>rd</sup> level is unclear.
- c. Atrium
- i. Positive
  - 1. Like the "wrapping around" of the school w/ art
  - 2. Level 2 glassy-nice curb appeal
  - 3. Library concept in the middle of the school is appealing.

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- 4. Pods pushed to the North w/ minimal offset. Good views to the North.
- 5. Like the atrium's flow and how it gives students the change to look down to other levels within the building.
- 6. Curved interior spaces is appealing like the softer organic shape.
- ii. Negative
  - 1. Missing a covered play area integrated into the design.
  - 2. Maybe make the design more monolithic, like the Burke Museum. The design right now looks like a lot of small boxes. This building is bigger than the surrounding houses. That's unavoidable so don't try to break up the building into house sized pieces.
