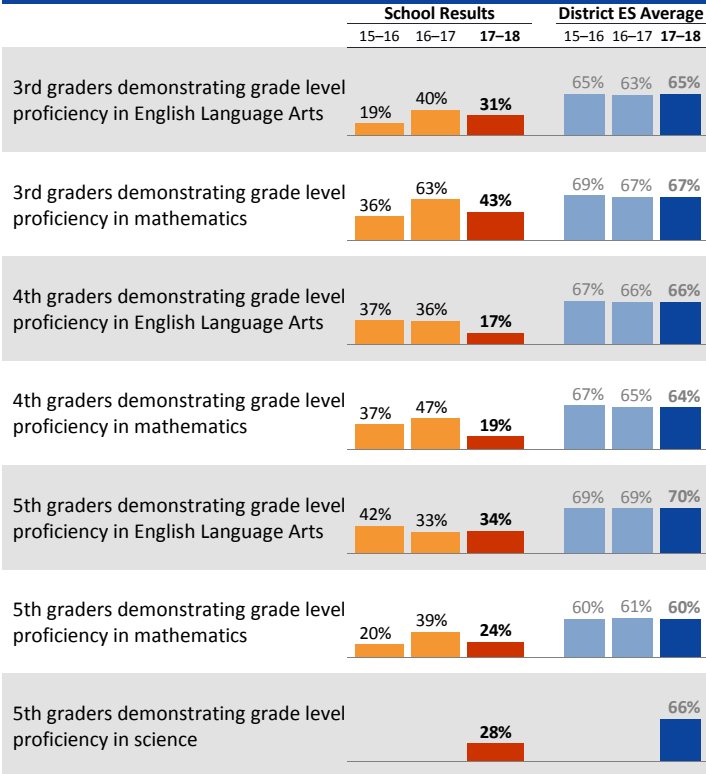

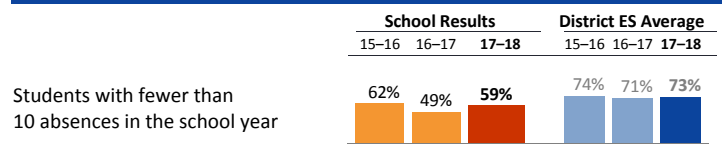

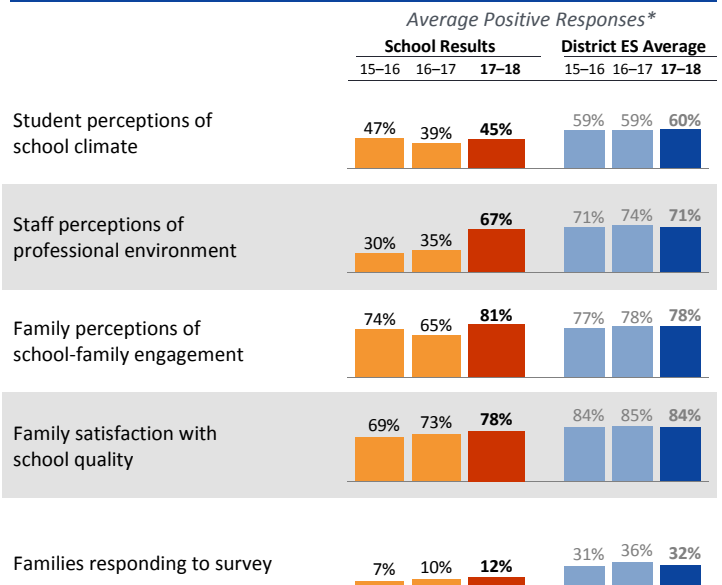

Attendance

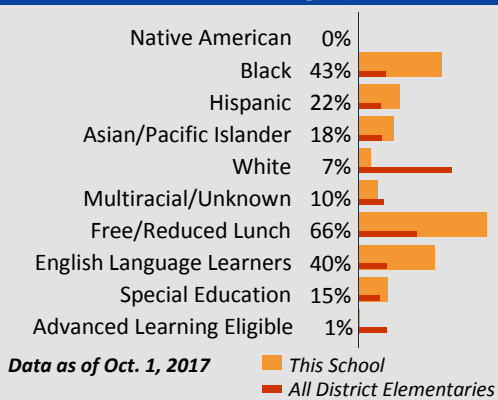


Student, Family, and Staff School Climate Survey

Emerson Elementary will provide a positive, respectful community that promotes high educational achievement through equitable access. Our students will build academic confidence and become active, socially responsible citizens.

School Goals

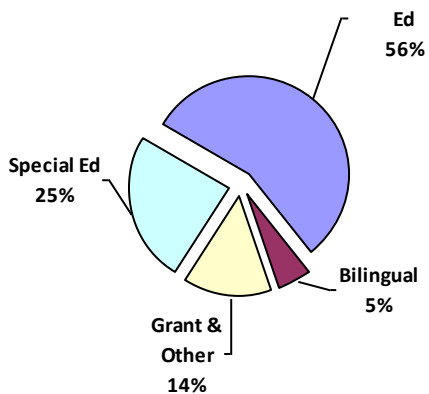
Our goals at Emerson Elementary school focus on supporting students grade level proficiency in reading. Our goal is to increase the percent of our students who qualify for ELL services and reading at grade level from 38% to 50%. We also have a goal of increasing our 4th grade cohorts percent at standard according to the ELA SBA from 31% to 41%. We have a whole school goal of increasing the percent of students at grade level according to the F&P to 60%. We are also looking for a 20% increase in positive responses on the student climate survey around the questions about student to student interactions.

School Description & Plan to Achieve Goals

Emerson Elementary provides a rigorous academic program that prepares PreK-5 students for acceleration in future schooling. At Emerson we believe in supporting the whole child. This means we value developing positive relationships with our students to support accelerating student learning. We talk about the decisions students make using our SOAR language (Safe, On Task, Act as a Team, and Resilient). We support student behavior by providing students Eagle Tickets to reinforce their SOARing behavior. Our staff members are committed to effective teaching using data to inform instruction. We provide reading instruction through CCC by focusing on phonics, phonemic awareness, comprehension, fluency, and vocabulary. This allows students to experience a balanced-literacy approach to reading. In math we balance conceptual and procedural understanding as we focus on supporting students through rigorous instruction and problem solving. We look through multiple data points to identify how to best support each student. This includes looking at attendance, behavior, and content standards. We meet in Professional Learning Communities (PLC's) to review multiple data points including: MAP, SBA, Fountas and Pinnell, interim data, and in class assessments to monitor student progress.
