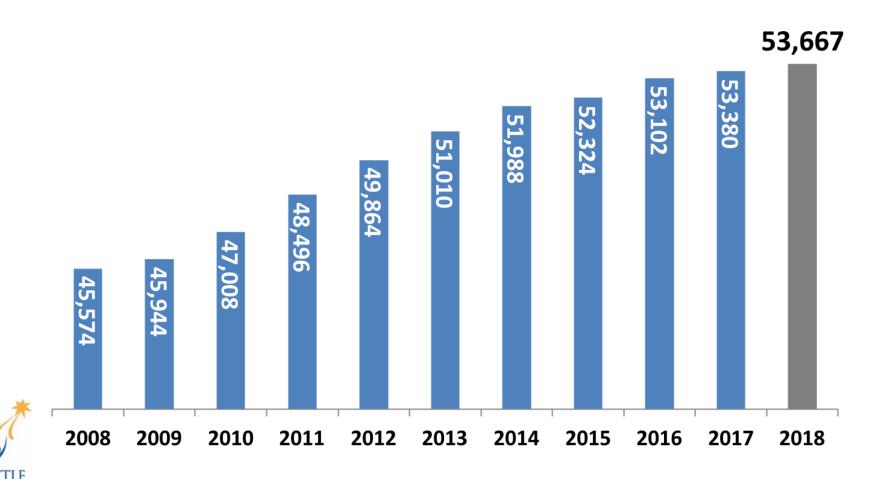

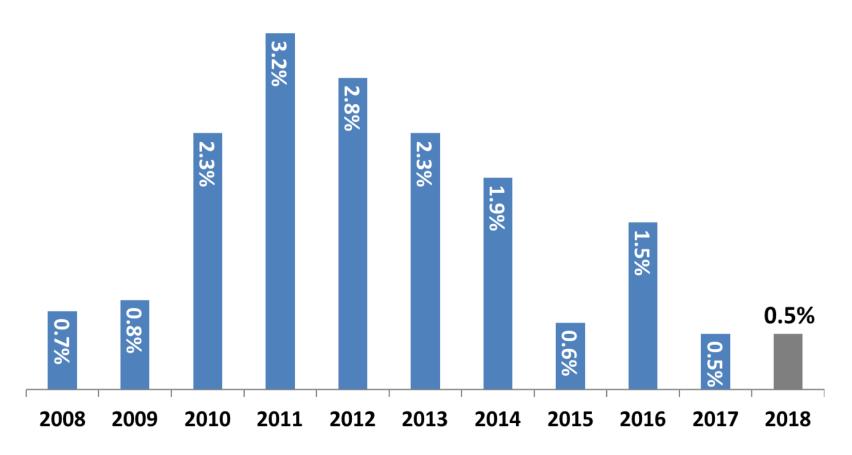

Elementary Schools Capacity Issues

School	Issue	Potential Solutions	Notes
Green Lake Elementary School	Overcapacity with no space for portables	Boundary change	 Limited space at B.F. Day due to Special Education and Pre-K placement Green Lake's boundary is large and part of the GeoZone for two option international schools
Magnolia Elementary School	Elementary schools in Queen Anne and Magnolia overcapacity. Magnolia ES opening in fall 2019.	Opening of Magnolia elementary school as attendance area school and boundary change	 Addition planned for Franz Coe in fall 2020, so anticipated that boundary change would only impact schools in Magnolia
Maple Elementary School	Overcapacity and largest Title 1 elementary school	Boundary change	 Boundary change planned for 2020-21 when new, larger Wing Luke building is completed, but community has requested relief happen earlier

Robert Eagle Staff Middle School (RESMS)	Building cannot accommodate RESMS and Licton Springs given growth of both schools	 Boundary change Move (or add additional) site for the Highly Capable Cohort 	 Changes to boundaries and HC location just implemented in 2017-18 school year
Asa Mercer International Middle School	Overcapacity with a significant number of portables	Boundary change	 Elementary schools feed into middle schools, so boundary change would involve moving an elementary to another middle school In order to minimize total impact boundary change could align with BEX V projects for Mercer



Capital Projects and Planning Changes for 2019-20

- Queen Anne Elementary addition (Total 500 seats; net addition of 72 seats)
 - Option school (no boundary changes planned), but GeoZone provides capacity relief for Franz Coe and John Hay
 - Additional permanent capacity: 170 seats
 - Remove 5 portables for net addition of 72 seats
- Magnolia Elementary opening (500 seats)
 - Anticipated capacity relief for Catherine Blaine and Lawton
 - Anticipated attendance area school and boundary change
- Lincoln High School opening (1,600 seats) and Ingraham High school addition (500 seats)
 - Provides 9-12 capacity relief in the north part of the district



Community Engagement to Date

- May 2018: Principal planning meetings and building walkthroughs to discuss potential changes, scenarios, and community engagement timeline
- June 2018: Community meetings on potential boundary changes
 - Maple & Van Asselt Boundary Change Meeting on June 14
 - Magnolia Boundary Change Meetings on June 11 & 13
- Summer 2018: Continued principal and parent leader meetings to discuss potential changes

Potential Student Assignment Transition Plan Changes for 2019-20

Timeline:

- Continuous Community Engagement
- Board Operations Committee:
 - o Target Date: Thursday, November 1, 2018
 - o Backup: Thursday, December 6, 2018
- Board Introduction
 - 2-4 weeks after Operations Committee depending on additional changes or engagement needed
 - Nov. 14 or Dec. 5
- Board Action

Target Date: December 19, 2018
 Backup: Jan. 9th or Jan. 23rd

Topics for Consideration

- 1. International / Dual Language Immersion Pathway Updates
 - Addition of a Southeast High School Pathway at Cleveland beginning in the 2019-20 SY (engagement with community needed).
 - Addition of a North end High School Pathway at Lincoln serving grades 9 and 10 only beginning in 2019-20 SY (already approved by the School Board in 2017-18 SY).
- 2. Highly Capable (HC) Updates
 - Lincoln HS as an HC pathway site beginning in 2019-20 serving grades 9 and 10 only (already approved by the School Board in 2017-18 SY)
 - HC or HC-eligible students entering 10th grade in 2019-20 may opt into Lincoln if they are at Garfield or at their attendance area school and live within the Lincoln HC pathway, even if they were not in HCC in 8th grade (already approved by the School Board in 2017-18 SY).
 - West Seattle as an HC pathway beginning in 2019-20. HC students from West Seattle who are currently in 6th and 7th grade at Washington Middle School can continue to Garfield instead of moving to the new southwest pathway (already approved by the School Board in 2017-18 SY)
 - Clean up of the Advanced Learning (AL) language to indicate that Advanced Learning (Spectrum) is available at all schools. Removal of "Spectrum" tiebreakers from Student Assignment Transition Plan in 2019-20 since AL available at all schools.
- 3. Grade Level Adjustment for Middle College from 11-12 to 9-12 beginning in the 2019-20 SY (engagement with community needed).
- 4. Blending of Graham Hill's Montessori program and removal of Montessori tiebreakers for Graham Hill beginning in the 2019-20 SY (requested by the school staff but additional engagement with community needed).
- 5. Changing name of "Service Schools" to Options Schools with Continuous Enrollment and noting they have continuous enrollment all year long. These schools will not have Geo-Zones, and the enrollment process will not change because of this change.
