## 1. TITLE

BEX IV: Approval of Budget Transfer and Award Construction Contract P5127, Bid No. B03973, to Slate Construction, Inc. for the Sand Point and Laurelhurst Seismic Improvement project

## 2. PURPOSE

This motion would approve a one-time fund transfer in the amount of $\$ 595,376$, from the BEX IV Program Contingency and authorize the Superintendent to enter into a construction contract in the amount of $\$ 1,577,480$, including base bid plus Alternate \#1, plus Washington State Sales Tax, for the Sand Point and Laurelhurst Seismic Improvement project.

## 3. RECOMMENDED MOTION

I move that the School Board:

1) Approve the transfer in the amount of $\$ 595,376$ from the BEX IV Program Contingency to the Sand Point and Laurelhurst Seismic Improvement project budget; and
2) Authorize the Superintendent to execute construction contract P5127 for the project with Slate Construction, Inc. in the amount of $\$ 1,577,480$, including Alternate \#1, plus Washington State Sales Tax, with any minor additions, deletions, and modifications deemed necessary by the Superintendent, and to take any necessary actions to implement the contract. Immediate action is in the best interest of the district.

## 4. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

a. Background

The Sand Point and Laurelhurst Seismic Improvement project consists of two sites with the following addresses:

- Sand Point Elementary- $620860^{\text {th }}$ Avenue Northeast, Seattle, WA 98105
- Laurelhurst Elementary - $453046^{\text {th }}$ Avenue Northeast, Seattle, WA 98105

These seismic improvements at the identified schools were funded through the BEX IV levy passed by the voters in February 2013. The levy included the Sand Point and

Laurelhurst Seismic Improvement project to be implemented during the summer preceding 2019-2020 school year.

The Sand Point and Laurelhurst Seismic Improvement project was publicly bid April 25, 2019, with a total of two bids being received. The scope of work for this project is to seismically improve each school and requires selective demolition, patching and repair of existing walls, ceilings, floors, and finishes with modifications to mechanical, plumbing, fire alarm, and electrical systems.

This motion allows the transfer of $\$ 595,376$ funds from the BEX IV Program Contingency to the Sand Point and Laurelhurst Seismic Improvement project budget. The transfer will adjust the original Sand Point and Laurelhurst Seismic Improvement project budget of $\$ 1,621,021$ to the current estimated total project budget of $\$ 2,216,397$. The BEX/BTA Oversight Committee was apprised of a need for a budget transfer for this project at their meeting of April 12, 2019. The BEX/BTA Oversight Committee was provided a range in lieu of the exact fiscal amount as bids had not been opened.

This motion allows the district to execute a construction contract with Slate Construction, Inc, who was the low responsive, responsible bidder.

Sand Point Elementary was constructed in 1957. Prior improvements for Sand Point Elementary in 2010 included mechanical and electrical upgrades. Laurelhurst Elementary was built in 1928. Prior improvements to Laurelhurst in 2010 included mechanical and electrical upgrades; and technology, ADA, waterline, and roof upgrades in 2017.

## b. Alternatives

Deny Motion. If motion is denied, the district will not be able to execute the contract to start the design of the Sand Point and Laurelhurst Seismic Improvement project. This is not recommended because it would negatively impact the district's commitment to provide equitable access in our schools in conjunction with the Seattle Existing Building Codes requirement to provide enhance ADA facilities on construction projects.

1. Transfer of $\$ 595,376$ from the BEX IV Program Contingency to the Sand Point and Laurelhurst Seismic Improvement projects budget; and
2. Award Construction Contract P5127 to Slate Construction Inc., in the amount of $\$ 1,577,480$ plus Washington State Sales Tax.

The revenue source for this motion is from the BEX IV Capital Levy.

The selection of projects in the BEX IV program went through an extensive community vetting process and ultimately received 72\% approval from voters in February 2013.

## 7. EQUITY ANALYSIS

This motion was not put through the process of an equity analysis. The selection of projects in the BEX IV program was designed to provide equitable access to safe school facilities across the city. The schools incorporate newer ADA upgrades in conjunction with requirements by the City of Seattle's Existing Building Code. The project will enhance toilet room facilities with compliant ADA grab bars, doors, and doorways.

## 8. STUDENT BENEFIT

It is the goal of the district to continue the process of implementing the BTA and BEX Capital Levy programs and provide students with safe and secure school buildings.
