C. Action Items

1. <u>Amending Policy No. 6022, Economic Stabilization Account (ESA)</u> - (A&F, Apr. 18, for consideration) Approval of this item would amend Policy No. 6022, Economic Stabilization Account.

Director Pinkham moved to approve this item. Director Patu seconded.

Staff member JoLynn Berge spoke about the policy of economic stabilization account and usage.

This motion passed unanimously

2. Purchase of Student and Staff Computers for New BEX IV Schools and BTA III
Projects Opening Summer 2017 - (Ops., Apr. 20, for approval) Approval of this item
would authorize the Superintendent to execute purchase orders through Bid No. 06691
with Thornburg for a total not to exceed \$1.6M, plus WA State Sales Tax.

Director Pinkham moved to approve this item. Director Patu seconded. Director Blanford noted the Ops Committee recommendation.

Staff member John Kroll spoke about this item purchasing computers for teacher and students of schools opening in fall 2017. An addendum was added and included letters from principals, a survey regarding engagement, and outreach about what technologies schools wanted. Mr. Kroll answered questions from Directors regarding updating technology for all teachers with outdated equipment.

This motion passed unanimously.

D. Introduction Items

1. <u>Approval of 2017-2018 School Year Calendar</u> - (Exec., May 4, for consideration) Approval of this item would approve the 2017-18 School Year Calendar.

Staff member Clover Codd spoke about the agreement with SEA and spoke about the changes to the school year calendar for 2017-2018. There is a shared interested in finding time for teachers to collaborate to increase student performance and allows educators to provide support, insight, planning appropriate lessons. Staff member Carri Campbell spoke about surveying family and community members as part of the engagement strategies. Weekly early releases and the additional 75 minutes for whole school professional development. SEA representative Michael Tamayo spoke about the agreement Staff member Carri Campbell spoke about the engagement strategies used for determining the school year calendar.

Approval of the City of Seattle Project Services Contract - Office of Superintendent
of Public Instruction/United States Department of Agriculture (OSPI/USDA) 2017
Summer Food Services Program - (Ops, Apr. 20, for consideration) Approval of this
item would authorize the Superintendent to execute a contract with the City of Seattle in
the amount of \$646,949.00, to provide breakfast, lunch and afternoon snacks for the
OSPI/USDA Summer Food Service Program.

Director Blanford spoke about the Ops Committee Recommendation.

Staff member Teresa Fields spoke about the contract with United States Department of Agriculture, OSPI, and USDA in regards to the Summer Food Service Program.

3. Accepting Transportation and Crossing Guard Grants from the City of Seattle - (A&F, May 11, 2017 for approval) Approval of this item would authorize the Superintendent to accept two grants from the City of Seattle if approved by the City on or before June 15, for the 2017-18 school year.

Staff member Pegi McEvoy spoke accepting funds from the City of Seattle for two programs. Ms. McEvoy spoke about the crossing guard program and bell times. Director Geary asked about the community engagement tool and Ms. McEvoy mentioned she would prepare updates to provide. Ms. McEvoy answered a question from directors about why this item went to Audit and Finance instead of Operations and it was due to timing.

4. City of Seattle Families & Education Levy Funding for Seattle Public Schools for Summer Learning 2017 and the 2017-18 School Year - (A&F, May 11, for consideration) Approval of this item would authorize the Superintendent to accept the grant funds totaling \$16,905,221.00 from the City of Seattle's Families and Education Levy (FEL) funded programs with the City of Seattle's Department of Education and Early Learning for the Family Support Worker, Elementary, Middle and High School Innovation, Middle School Linkage, and School Nurses.

Staff member Michael Stone spoke about the 16.9 million Family and Education Levy passed in 2011 by the City of Seattle and conducted a RFI to allocate funds to buildings,

which now includes two elementary schools and one additional high school. Brings the total up to 43 schools as well as family support worker program, health clinics at 9 high schools, middle schools, and elementary schools.

5. Resolution 2016/17-23, Allowing Usage of a Portion of the Economic Stabilization Account - (A&F, May 11, for approval) Approval of this item would adopt Resolution 2016/17-23, allowing the usage of \$11,500,000 of the Economic Stabilization Account and adopt a plan to repay the amount starting in the 2018-19 school year.

Staff member JoLynn Berge explained this BAR is necessary to balance the 2017-18 budget. The economic stabilization repayment account will be paid starting 2018-19 school year thus restoring the \$11.5 million.

 Approval of Annual Head Start Grant - (A&F, May 11, for approval) Approval of this item would accept \$4,508,982 from the Department of Health & Human Services/Federal Government to provide Head Start services for within SPS federal fiscal year 2017-18.

Staff member Gene Gousie spoke about the annual application for the Head Start program looking to access 4.5 million funds from the administration for children and families to serve 360 families in nine elementary schools. Head start policy council approved.

7. <u>Approval of the 2017-2018 Student Rights & Responsibilities</u> - (C&I, May 8, for consideration) Approval of this item would approve the 2017-18 School Year Student Rights & Responsibilities document.

Staff member Erin Romanuk spoke about the collaboration that was necessary for this change to create a more simplifying and readable document for families. Ms. Romanuk answered questions from directors about clarifying definitions and continuing to refine the document with consideration and feedback from educators.

8. University of Washington Experimental Education Unit (EEU) Interagency
Agreement to Provide Education Services to Special Education Students, Ages 3-6 (C&I, May 8, for consideration) Approval of this item would authorize the
Superintendent to execute agreements with University of Washington Haring Center
totaling \$1,205,241.66, which would provide special education services to 48
preschoolers and 15 kindergartners, as well as technical support for 3-5 schools for
inclusion practices for students with special needs during the 2017-18 school year.

Staff member Michaela Clancy spoke about this annual interagency agreement in early childhood special education. Dr. Clancy spoke about the minor changes and about the partnership with the Experimental Education Unit. Dr. Clancy also spoke about the successful professional development components and the train the trainer model.

9. Contract approval for Early Support for Infants & Toddlers (Birth to 3 Intervention Service Providers) - (A&F, May 11, for approval) Approval of this item would authorize the Superintendent to execute contracts with EEU in the amount of

\$151,480, Wonderland Developmental Center in the amount of \$252,470, Northwest center in the amount of \$757,395, and Boyer Children's Clinic in the amount of \$1,262,320, to ensure the provision of Early Intervention services.

Staff member Michaela Clancy spoke about this extension of the RFQ and the contract increase because of increase of participation.
