1. TITLE

BEX V and Distressed School Grant: Approval of four actions related to the West Woodland Modernization and Addition project

2. <u>PURPOSE</u>

The purpose of this action is to provide authorization for the Superintendent to enter into Architectural & Engineering (A/E) contracts for the following items related to the West Woodland Elementary School Renovation and Addition project:

- a. Authorize the Superintendent to enter into an Architectural & Engineering (A/E) contract with the McGranahan Architects in the amount of \$1,638,228, plus reimbursable expenses not to exceed \$25,000.
- b. Authorize the Superintendent to accept and obligate 2017 Distressed School Grant (DSG) funds in the amount \$6,000,000.
- c. Allow transfer of \$2,500,000 from the K-3 Class Size Reduction Grant to the West Woodland Elementary School Renovation and Addition project to construct two additional Kindergarten classrooms with associated restrooms.
- d. Allow transfer of \$2,600,000 from BEX V Program Contingency to the West Woodland Elementary School Renovation and Addition project—to augment construction escalation for the 2017 Distressed School Grant funds for the construction of ten classrooms (four Kindergarten classrooms with associated restrooms and six general education classrooms).

3. RECOMMENDED MOTION

I move that the School Board:

- a. Authorize the Superintendent to execute A/E Contract K1352 with McGranahan Architects in the amount of \$1,613,228, plus reimbursable expenses not to exceed \$25,000 for architectural and engineering services for the West Woodland Elementary School Renovation and Addition project, with any minor additions, deletions, and modifications deemed necessary by the Superintendent, and to take any necessary actions to implement the contract; and
- b. Authorize the Superintendent to accept and obligate 2017 Distressed School Grant funds in the amount of \$6,000,000 for the West Woodland Elementary School Renovation and Addition project budget; and

- c. Approve a one-time fund transfer of \$2,500,000 from the K-3 Class Size Reduction Grant to the West Woodland Elementary School Renovation and Addition project; and
- d. Approve a one-time fund transfer of \$2,600,000 from the BEX V Program Contingency to the West Woodland Elementary School Renovation and Addition project.

4. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

a. Background

The West Woodland Elementary Renovation and Addition project is located at 5601 4th Ave NW, Seattle WA 98107, and is funded from the 2017 Distressed School Grant and the Building Excellence (BEX) V Capital Levy. West Woodland Elementary School has been significantly over capacity for more than five years. Currently, there are seven portable classrooms on site, with other spaces within the building converted into classroom use. Enrollment projections show this trend continuing, with no significant decrease in student enrollment anticipated. There is a need for additional permanent capacity at this school.

The project scope includes a 12-classroom addition to the existing 1991 building (2017 DSG and K-3 Class-Size Reduction Grant funded), renovations to the existing Commons/Gymnasium to construct a new Commons (BEX V funded), a new Gymnasium addition (BEX V funded), and miscellaneous site improvements (BEX V, 2017 DSG and K-3 Class Size Reduction Grant funded). Construction is anticipated to begin Summer 2020 and be complete Summer 2021, with a current construction cost estimate not to exceed \$13,045,800.

The initial DSG request was made to the State of Washington during Winter 2016 in the amount of \$6,685,000. SPS received acknowledgement of State of Washington Distressed School Funding January 2018 in the amount of \$6,000,000. BEX V Program Contingency dollars are being utilized to augment construction cost escalation for the 2017 Distressed School Grant funds to construct ten classrooms.

The firm of McGranahan Architects was selected through the Architecture and Engineering (A/E) selection procedures established in Superintendent Procedure 6220SP.C. Eleven (11) firms submitted their qualifications and four (4) firms were shortlisted and interviewed, McGranahan Architects, NAC Architects, Studio Meng Strazzarra, and Rolluda Architects were interviewed. McGranahan Architects was judged to be the most qualified to provide design services for this project.

Prior Capital improvements made at West Woodland Elementary School since the year 2000 include: interior and exterior renovations, ADA upgrades, library and playground improvements 2010; ground source heat pump installation 2013; and a roof replacement project 2014.

The additional funding requested will enable the school district to provide students and staff with an up-to-date teaching and learning facility throughout the facility as defined by the current educational specifications.

5. FISCAL IMPACT/REVENUE SOURCE

The fiscal impact of this motion will be \$12,738,228 for the Architectural contract and budget increase for the West Woodland Elementary School Renovation and Addition project. The revenue source for this motion, includes: the BEX V Capital Levy; State of Washington - 2017 Distressed School Grant Funds; State of Washington - K-3 Class Size Reduction Grant Funds; and, the BEX V Capital Levy Program Contingency.

12. TIMELINE FOR IMPLEMENTATION

Design will begin upon execution of this contract. Construction will begin in Spring of 2020 and be completed in Summer of 2021.
