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### 1. TITLE

BEX II/BEX III: Approval for a Budget Transfer from the Building Excellence (BEX) II and III Program

For Introduction: March 15, 2017

For Action: April 5, 2017

Underspend for Implementation of an Energy Efficiency

Project at Six Seattle Public Schools

## 2. PURPOSE

This Board Action would transfer \$1,595,632 in funding using the oldest unallocated levy funds first, from BEX II and BEX III capital program underspend, to create a project budget for the implementation of an energy efficiency project at six schools utilizing solar technology.

## 3. RECOMMENDED MOTION

I move that the School Board approve a one-time fund transfer from the Building Excellence (BEX) II and BEX III capital program underspend in the amount of \$1,595,632 for the implementation of an energy efficiency project at six schools utilizing solar photovoltaic technology.

## 4. <u>BACKGROUND INFORMATION</u>

### a. Background

### **Need for Budget Transfer to Fund Project:**

Seattle Public Schools, through the adoption of Board Resolution 2012/13-12 "the Green Resolution," has expressed its desire to optimize energy efficiency through cost effective practices and pursue outside funding partners to help leverage available incentive programs.

Seattle Public Schools desires to apply for an energy efficiency grant in the amount of \$500,000 through the State of Washington Department of Commerce. The State of Washington Department of Commerce received a \$25,000,000 appropriation in the 2015-2017 state Capital budget to continue the Energy Efficiency and Solar Grants program. Eligible entities include state public higher education institutions, local government facilities, state agencies and K-12 public school districts. This program focuses on funding the best projects possible to increase energy and cost savings in the publicly built environment. These grants are awarded through a competitive process and must be used solely for energy and operational cost saving and solar installations.

Round one awards were announced in May 2016, with over \$10 million in energy efficiency and solar grants to help eight higher education institutions, 32 local governments, four state agencies and eight K-12 public school districts lower their energy costs. With \$15 million in energy efficiency and solar grant dollars remaining, the Department of Commerce has



commenced round two with an application deadline of March 9, 2017. The application requires a detailed budget including owner provided funding. If the District is not awarded an energy efficiency grant in round two the project will be implemented and the District funds will return to their original funding source.

The overall project budget totals \$2,302,374 with a measurement verification period of three years; funding for the project is allocated as follows:

Seattle Public Schools Department of Capital Projects and Planning has evaluated fourteen potential school sites and identified six school sites where annual savings would provide a positive cash flow.

The six facilities selected are:

- i. Arbor Heights
- ii. Hazel Wolf
- iii. Ballard
- iv. Bailey Gatzert
- v. Denny International School
- vi. South Shore

Selection was based on, but not limited to: BEX projects as they were designed to be solar ready; cost effectiveness criteria to ensure a competitive grant application; and geographic location to ensure equity throughout the district facilities inventory.

### **Energy Savings Performance Contracting Project Delivery**

The District entered into an inter-local agreement with the State of Washington Department of Enterprise Services, Engineering and Architectural Services (DES) to provide assistance in developing the cost effectiveness criteria from which the final facility selections were made. If the District is awarded the grant, DES will also provide other services as required for a successful project including, but not limited to: assistance during design, construction and commissioning, review and approval of invoice vouchers for payment and assistance with final project acceptance.

The project delivery method will be a Design/Build approach as authorized by RCW 39.35 where the Contractor or Energy Service Company (ESCO) guarantees the performance, cost and savings of the project. The ESCO guaranteed energy savings in year one is: \$58,215, which is the minimum amount per year.

The proposed solar panel installations will "harmonize" with the designs of the buildings and be an aesthetically pleasing solution. The installations will be limited to the existing roof surfaces with the goal of not being readily visible to site occupants except from the energy dashboard for educational use.

This request to transfer funds from the BEX II and BEX III underspend to create a Energy Efficiency Project at six Seattle Public Schools will not affect the funding budgeted for the BEX II and BEX III programs.

Exhibit A attached summarizes the costs that comprise the funding request.

#### b. Alternatives

If the motion is denied, the Department of Commerce Energy Efficiency and Solar Grant for Six Seattle Public Schools project would not be completed and the District's students will not benefit from grant-funded facilities infrastructure improvements and savings generated for the General Fund.

### 12. <u>TIMELINE FOR IMPLEMENTATION</u>

Upon approval of this motion, the District will be able to proceed with

- Interconnection Agreement with Seattle City Light
- Design and Permitting
- Construction anticipated to occur Summer 2018

Should the District not be awarded a Department of Commerce grant in the amount of \$500,000 in late-Spring/early-Summer 2017, the project will be postponed for a period of one year and the grant resubmitted in 2018.
