1. <u>TITLE</u>

BTA III: Award Construction Contract K5106, Bid No. B12839, to Western Ventures Construction for the John Muir Geothermal Wells project

2. <u>PURPOSE</u>

The purpose of this action is to provide authorization for the Superintendent to enter into a construction contract with Western Ventures Construction in the amount of \$1,703,500, including base bid plus Alternate #1 and #3, plus Washington State Sales Tax, for the John Muir Geothermal Wells project.

3. <u>RECOMMENDED MOTION</u>

I move that the School Board authorize the Superintendent to execute construction contract K5106 with Western Ventures Construction in the amount of \$1,703,500, including base bid plus Alternate #1 and #3, plus Washington State Sales Tax, with any minor additions, deletions, and modifications deemed necessary by the Superintendent, and to take any necessary actions to implement the contract.

4. <u>BACKGROUND INFORMATION</u>

a. Background

The John Muir Geothermal Wells project, located at 3301 South Horton Street, Seattle, WA, is funded through the BTA III levy passed by the voters in February 2010. The levy included the John Muir Green Energy project to be completed in advance of the 2019-2020 school year.

The John Muir Geothermal Wells project was publicly bid on February 26, 2019, with a total of two (2) bids being received. The scope of work for this project includes the installation of 80 geothermal wells each 350 feet deep, installation of piping connections, and connection to the building's hydronic heating and cooling system.

This motion allows the district to execute a construction contract with Western Ventures Construction, who was deemed the low responsive, responsible bidder. The school was completely modernized in 1991. Prior improvements that have been made at the John Muir Elementary School since the year 2000 include accelerated technology improvements, mechanical upgrades, re-roofing work, seismic improvements, and heat pump replacement.

a. Alternatives

Deny Motion. If motion is denied, the district will not be able to execute the contract to implement seismic improvements to the John Muir school. This is not recommended because it would negatively impact the district's commitment to provide equitable access in our schools.

The selection of projects in the 2010 BTA III program went through an extensive community vetting process and ultimately received more than 73% voter approval in February 2010.
