1. TITLE

Adoption of Board Policy No. 6225, Use of Electronic Signature

2. <u>PURPOSE</u>

This Board Action Report adopts new Board Policy No. 6225, Use of Electronic Signature, in order to formally authorize the use of electronic records and signatures for district documents.

3. RECOMMENDED MOTION

I move that the School Board adopt Board Policy No. 6225, Use of Electronic Signature, as attached to the Board Action Report.

4. <u>BACKGROUND INFORMATION</u>

a. **Background**

The Uniform Electronic Transactions Act (UETA), Chapter 1.80 RCW, adopted on June 11, 2020, repealed and replaced an earlier state statute authorizing the use of electronic records and signatures. One provision of the UETA, RCW 1.80.160, requires governmental agencies to determine whether, and the extent to which, the agency "will create and retain electronic records and convert written records to electronic records." A second provision of the UETA, RCW 1.80.170, requires governmental agencies to determine whether, and the extent to which, the agency "will send and accept electronic records and electronic signatures to and from other persons and otherwise create, generate, communicate, store, process, use, and rely upon electronic records and electronic signatures."

The Washington State School Directors' Association has recommended adoption of a policy authorizing the use of electronic signatures to support efforts to reduce the reliance on paper records and allow for more timely execution of Board and district documents, particularly while Directors and many staff work remotely during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

b. Alternatives

Because the UETA requires every governmental agency within the State of Washington to determine whether to authorize the use of electronic records and signatures, the alternative is for

the Board to adopt a Board Policy prohibiting the use of electronic records and signatures. This is not recommended as the current remote work environment has made it challenging to gather signatures on hard copy documents, delaying the ability for key documents—like adopted and signed Board resolutions—to be posted to the School Board website and appropriately archived.

c. Research

This proposed Board Policy was developed after review of the Washington State School Directors' Association model policy 6225 and the new Uniform Electronic Transactions Act.

5. FISCAL IMPACT/REVENUE SOURCE

This action is not anticipated to have a fiscal impact. Platforms to implement electronic signatures are currently in place for the execution of documents under this new board policy.

a significant impact outside of internal operations, but will have the benefit of speeding public access—including for students—to signed Board resolutions, which are posted online.

USE OF ELECTRONIC SIGNATURE

Policy No. 6225

[DATE]

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The district encourages electronic transactions and the use of electronic records and signatures, and recognizes electronic signatures as legally binding and equivalent in force and effect as a traditional signature made when a person physically marks a document with the intent to sign the record.

An electronic signature is an acceptable substitute for a traditional signature on records requiring the signature of any record whenever the use of a traditional signature is authorized or required, except as prohibited by law or as provided herein.

If an electronic signature is used for interstate transactions or for documents required by the US Federal government, the electronic signature shall comply with the requirements of the Electronic Signatures in Global and Electronic Commerce Act.

This policy in no way affects the district's ability to conduct a transaction using a physical medium and shall not be construed as a prohibition on the use of traditional signatures.
