## 1. <u>TITLE</u>

BTA IV: Award Construction Contract K5113 to King County Directors Association (KCDA) and Musco Sports Lighting, LLC, for the Garfield High School Athletic Field Lighting project

## 2. PURPOSE

The purpose of this action is to provide authorization for the Superintendent to enter in a construction contract in the amount of \$408,714.00, plus Washington State Sales Tax, with any minor additions, deletions, and modifications deemed necessary by the Superintendent, and to take any necessary actions to implement the contract.

## 3. RECOMMENDED MOTION

I move that the School Board authorize the Superintendent to execute Construction Contract K5113 for the Garfield High School Athletic Field Lighting project with King County Directors Association (KCDA) and Musco Sports Lighting, LLC, in the amount of \$408,714.00, plus Washington State Sales Tax, with any minor additions, deletions, and modifications deemed necessary by the Superintendent, and to take any necessary actions to implement the contract.

## 4. <u>BACKGROUND INFORMATION</u>

#### a. Background

The Garfield High School Athletic Field Lighting project, located at 400 23<sup>rd</sup> Avenue, Seattle, WA 98122, is funded through the BTA IV Capital Levy passed by voters in February 2016. The district is completing installations of athletic field lighting at Ballard High School, Roosevelt High School and Robert Eagle Staff Middle School and will soon to be installing athletic field lights at Franklin High School and Cleveland High School. Funding for these projects, as well as the Garfield High School Athletic Field Lighting project, are funded from the Building, Technology and Academics/Athletics IV (BTA IV) Program.

In the fall of 2016, the district changed start times for high school students to begin classes at 8:50 a.m. with dismissals at 3:20 p.m., approximately 1 hour later than the previous year. In the fall of 2017, high school start times were changed to 8:45 and 8:55 a.m. with dismissals at 3:35 and 3:45 p.m. The change in dismissal times means that school athletic fields are used for practice later in the day, reducing the time that unlighted fields are available for school practices and events for community use under the

Joint Use Agreement with Parks. This was identified as a significant adverse impact in the Change in School Start Times Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) (SPS, 2015). The Joint Use Agreement with Parks is to increase youth and community access to district facilities and grounds and to increase student access to Parks facilities and grounds. Field lighting will assist in relieving the demand for all-season, multi-use fields in the City by extending the use time. The district and the Seattle Department of Parks and Recreation (Parks) have been working together to develop plans for installing lights at several district-owned athletic fields around the City.

The athletic field lighting work generally includes labor and materials to install light poles, shielded LED energy efficient floodlights, concrete foundations, and associated electrical and lighting controls work. There will be four, 70 ft. to 90 ft. tall light poles, at Garfield athletic field, two on the west side and two on east side. The lights will be programmed by the District's energy management system to turn on and off for scheduled events, and will not be on after 10:00 p.m.

The District is proposing to contract for the field lighting work at these schools using the King County Directors' Association. KCDA is a purchasing cooperative owned by Washington State Public School Districts. KCDA bids and awards supply and service contracts through open competition as prescribed by the laws of the State of Washington. This approach to project delivery allows several advantages, including but not limited to:

- KCDA will reduce the time needed for procurement as the process can begin immediately in obtaining a known vendor and contract amount for each school. This shortens the procurement time versus a traditional advertised bid process.
- Use of the shortened procurement process enables Capital staff to complete installation, possibly this summer, if all permits are obtained. Currently, the District is in the permitting process with the City of Seattle for a Master Use Permit (MUP) and a building permit.
- The Architects/Engineers on each of these projects have based their designs on Musco athletic field lighting which is the only manufacturer that can meet the City of Seattle's minimum spill light requirements. Musco currently has a contract in place with KCDA.

#### b. Alternatives

Deny Motion. If this motion is denied, the field lighting will not be installed in a timely manner and the District will have to continue to limit school athletics and Seattle Parks use to daylight hours.
