1. TITLE

BEX III, BEX IV and Distressed School Grant: Final
Acceptance of Public Works Contract P5042 with Bayley
Construction, Inc., for the Cedar Park Elementary School

Renovation project

2. PURPOSE

Board action is needed to approve final acceptance of Public Works Contract P5042 with Bayley Construction Inc., for the Cedar Park Elementary School Renovation project for the purpose of avoiding disputes over the timing of the filing of liens prior to the release of retention.

3. <u>RECOMMENDED MOTION</u>

I move that the School Board accept the work performed under the Building Excellence (BEX) III, IV and Distressed School Grant funded Public Works Contract P5042, with Bayley Construction, Inc., for the Cedar Park Elementary School Renovation project, as final.

4. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

a) **Background**: This project renovated and re-opened the Cedar Park Elementary School facility and is currently being used as the interim location for Olympic Hills Elementary while its new facility, is being constructed. Once Olympic Hills returns to its new facility, the Cedar Park facility will be available to serve as a new elementary school beginning in the fall of 2017.

The budget for this project is over by 2 1/2% or about \$240,000. This overage will be funded by BTA III under spend. The Construction budget is on budget but other costs exceeded the anticipated budget or <u>no</u> budget was anticipated for certain items. The largest overage was for additional Architectural Services. When the contract was written, the project was over 3 million smaller. The project did not include 8 modular classrooms, sidewalks and other civil requirements. Permitting was more involved and administration for OSPI funding. Other major costs were for increased city permits and water connection fees, technology, and furniture costs. Work orders for landscape and move-in necessities exceeded the anticipated budget as well.

b) **Alternatives:** Not accepting the project in a timely manner could put the District in a position subject to litigation. Therefore, this alternative is not recommended.
