1. TITLE

BTA III: Resolution 2018/19-24, Final Acceptance of Contract K5080 with Mike Werlech Construction Inc., for the Blaine K-8 Water Mains and Fire Sprinklers project

2. PURPOSE

The purpose of this action is to approve final acceptance of Contract K5080 with Mike Werlech Construction Inc., for the Blaine K-8 Water Mains and Fire Sprinklers project. Board approval allows the district to submit required documents to the State of Washington Department of Labor & Industries, Department of Revenue, and the Employment Security Department, and closeout the project, including authorizing the release of project retainage.

3. <u>RECOMMENDED MOTION</u>

I move that the School Board adopt Resolution 2018/19-24 and accept the work performed under Contract K5080 with Mike Werlech Construction Inc., for the Blaine Water Mains and Fire Sprinklers project as final.

4. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

a. Background

- This project was funded out of BTA III Capital Levy funds. This project involved the water main and fire suppression system replacement at Catharine Blaine K-8. Catharine Blaine K-8 is located at 2550 34th Avenue West, Seattle, WA 98199. The school was constructed in 1950. Prior improvements that have been made at the Catharine Blaine K-8 School since the year 2000 include reroofing, library upgrades, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) mechanical upgrades, and direct digital controls (DDC) system replacement. In the summer of 2019, Blaine K-8 School will also receive seismic improvements.
- Hultz BHU Engineers designed the project. The district sought bids for the water main and fire suppression system work in the winter of 2017, and Mike Werlech Construction Inc., was awarded the project for a contract amount of \$949,223, plus Washington State Sales Tax (WSST). The scope of work included removing the existing water service main, installing the new domestic water and fire suppression water services to the building, constructing a new water header, and fire sprinkler riser and suppression system throughout the building.

Mike Werlech Construction Inc., satisfactorily completed the contract work, and the
consultant, Hultz BHU Engineers, agrees and recommends Board final acceptance of the
project. In accordance with WAC 392-344-160, Board approval of final acceptance is
required to release project retainage.

b. Alternatives

Not accepting the project in a timely manner could put the district in a position subject to litigation. Therefore, this alternative is not recommended.

5. FISCAL IMPACT/REVENUE SOURCE

All payments have been made to the contract from the BTA III Capital levy funds. No outstanding invoices remain.

During the course of the project, four Change Orders were issued. Change Orders totaled \$115,304.00 plus WSST. Change order expenditures totaled 12.14% of the construction contract. The most significant time and dollar impact was Seattle Department of Transportation's (SDOT) requirement for a new American Disability Act (ADA) crosswalk. The crosswalk improvements were not identified as required work during the permit review process and in fact, SDOT only required these improvements when the Construction was nearing completion. This required a separate permit process through SDOT and a separate mobilization of construction staff and added \$108,788 to the overall project cost.
