## 1. TITLE

BEX IV: Final Acceptance of Contract P5043 with Spee West Construction Company for the Genesee Hill School Replacement Project

## 2. PURPOSE

Board action is required to approve final acceptance of Contract P5043 with Spee West Construction Company. Board approval allows the district to submit required documents to the State of Washington; Department of Labor & Industries, Department of Revenue and Employment Security Department and closeout the project, including authorizing the release of project retainage.

## 3. RECOMMENDED MOTION

I move that the School Board accept the work performed under Contract P5043 with Spee West Construction Company for the Genesee Hill School Replacement Project as final.

## 4. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

### a. Background

This project relocated the existing Schmitz Park School to a new 660-student capacity school constructed at the Genesee Hill School site. The scope of the project originated from the Meng Building Conditions Report issued April 2009, and overcrowding conditions/capacity concerns with the existing Schmitz Park School location.

BLRB Architects designed the new school with extensive engagement from the Schmitz Park School Design Advisory Team (SDAT). The district sought bids to build the new school in the Spring 2014 and Spee West Construction Company was awarded the project for a contract amount of \$25,793,000 plus Washington State Sales Tax (WSST). The scope of work included demolition of the existing Genesee Hill School and construction of a new 91,281 square foot school and associated site improvements.

Spee West Construction Company has satisfactorily completed the contract work and the consulting architect, BLRB Architects, and construction management firm, Heery International, Inc., agree and recommend Board final acceptance of the project.

#### b. Alternatives

Not accepting the project in a timely manner could put the District in a position subject to litigation. Therefore, this alternative is not recommended.

## 5. FISCAL IMPACT/REVENUE SOURCE

All payments have been made to the contract from the Building Excellence (BEX) IV Capital levy funds. No outstanding invoices remain.

During the course of the project, twenty-two Change Orders were issued comprised of 306 Changer Order Proposals or Construction Change Directives. Change Orders totaled \$2,250,342 plus WSST. Change order expenditures totaled 8.7% of the construction contract amount with the most significant expenditures associated with Seattle Department of Construction and Inspection (SDCI) code revisions concerning environmentally critical areas. These revisions resulted in additional steep slope shoring and a delay to the release of the building permit. SDCI's review was in response to the Oso landslide event. Weather delays also affected the project schedule (the fall and winter of 2015-2016 was the second wettest winter on record) requiring owner approved overtime to mitigate schedule delays. Change orders were reasonable for a project of this magnitude.
