1. TITLE

BTA III: Final Acceptance of Contract K5106 with Western Ventures Construction, Inc., for the John Muir Geothermal Wells project

2. PURPOSE

The purpose of this action is to approve final acceptance of Contract K5106 with Western Ventures Construction, Inc., for the John Muir Geothermal Wells project. Board approval allows the district to submit required documents to the Washington State Department of Labor & Industries, Department of Revenue, and Employment Security Department, and closeout the project, including authorizing the release of project retainage.

3. RECOMMENDED MOTION

I move that the School Board accept the work performed under Contract K5106 with Western Ventures Construction, Inc., for the John Muir Geothermal Wells project as final.

4. <u>BACKGROUND INFORMATION</u>

a. Background

The John Muir Geothermal Wells project, located at 3301 South Horton Street, Seattle, WA, is funded through the BTA III levy passed by the voters in February 2010. The school was completely modernized in 1991. Prior improvements that have been made at the John Muir Elementary School since the year 2000 include accelerated technology improvements, mechanical upgrades, re-roofing work, seismic improvements, and heat pump replacement.

IBI Group prepared the design and construction contract documents. The John Muir Geothermal Wells project was publicly bid on February 26, 2019, with a total of two (2) bids being received. The scope of work for this project includes the installation of 80 geothermal wells each 350 feet deep, installation of piping connections, and connection to the building's hydronic heating and cooling system.

Western Ventures Construction, Inc., has satisfactorily completed the contract work and IBI Group agrees and recommends Board final acceptance of the project. The apprenticeship utilization rate for this project is 11%. The final expenditure amount is \$2,296312

b. Alternatives

Not accepting the project in a timely manner could put the district in a position subject to litigation. Therefore, this alternative is not recommended.

5. FISCAL IMPACT/REVENUE SOURCE

All payments have been made to the contract from the BTA III Capital levy funds. No outstanding invoices remain.

During the course of the project, two (2) Change Orders were issued, comprised of five (5) Change Order Proposals or Construction Change Directives. Change Orders totaled \$36,506 plus Washington State Sales Tax (WSST). Change order expenditures totaled 2.1% of the construction contract amount with the most significant expenditures associated with revamped playground striping over the south geothermal well field.
