## The Reproductive System

Body systems, like the digestive system or the respiratory system, are made up body parts that function together to do a job.

During puberty, it's the job of the reproductive system to begin to function so that pregnancy is possible. Not all people will have a pregnancy in their life, but the reproductive system is the part of the body involved in creating a pregnancy.

## The Reproductive System

The anatomy of the reproductive system includes the genitals or external organs like the vulva (which includes the vagina) and penis.

It also includes internal organs like the uterus and testicles.

Everyone's anatomy looks a little different.


## The Reproductive System


When someone is born with a penis, they're typically assigned male. When someone is born with a vagina, they're typically assigned female.

Some people's assigned sex (male or female) matches their gender identity, some people's assigned sex doesn't. A person knows their gender identity because they feel like a boy, a girl, both, neither or somewhere in between, not because of their body parts.

People of all genders are welcome at school!

## Person With a Vagina











## Person With a Penis

When a baby is born, the penis has a retractable piece of skin covering the glans called the foreskin. Some parents choose for their baby to have a small operation to remove this skin, called circumcision. Parents make the choice to do this, or not to do this, based on many factors such as family tradition or religion.



It is perfectly healthy and normal to have foreskin, and it is perfectly healthy and normal to be circumcised!


