What is HIV/AIDS?

• HIV is a virus that attacks cells in the immune system, the body system that keeps us healthy.

 When HIV attacks many of these cells, called T cells, a doctor diagnoses that person with the disease called AIDS

Why is HIV/AIDS a serious illness?

 When a person has HIV it's easier for them to get sick and even die from infections their body could normally fight off.

 There's no cure for HIV but people with HIV can live for a long time with the help of medicine.

Why do we learn about HIV/AIDS?

We learn about HIV/AIDS so that you don't have to feel afraid of it.

People can prevent getting or giving HIV.

 People living with HIV/AIDS have been treated disrespectfully and should be treated respectfully.

How is HIV spread?

- HIV does NOT develop on its own in a person's body.
- HIV is a communicable illness; it passes from person to person.
- HIV doesn't spread like the flu; HIV doesn't go through the air.
- HIV does not spread easily.

In what ways is HIV spread?

- The only way HIV is passed is when infected body fluids enter another person's body through cuts, sores or contact with their genitals.
- Most body fluids don't spread HIV.
- The only body fluids that spread HIV are:
 - Blood infected with HIV
 - Vaginal fluid infected with HIV
 - Semen infected with HIV
 - Breast milk infected with HIV

Activity 1

- How might it feel to live with HIV?
- What ways might a person's life be different after getting HIV and what ways might it be the same?

How do people prevent HIV?

 Not allowing infected blood, semen, vaginal fluid or breast milk to enter a body.

 An example of how people protect themselves is by wearing gloves when touching blood or other body fluids.

Ways you cannot get HIV

You can't get HIV from a person with HIV even if you:

- Share things like pencils, food, yoga mats, toilets
- Touch like shake hands, hug, or kiss
- Swim in the same pool
- Are bit by a mosquito after them
- Get coughed or sneezed on by them
