The Need + How We Got Here

Benefits of an accessible, full-size field

Supports physical education & sports for boys & girls

Reduces bus trips and travel time

Reliable venue for school and community events

Current limitations without a dedicated field space

Transportation, access, and travel time - hours spent on buses




Community informed search

Began with an expansive evaluation of approx 20 potential sites across Seattle

Wallingford Playfield selected for in-depth exploration and ultimately eliminated

Woodland Park emerged as a community-informed option

Full-Size Field at Woodland Park




Eliminated Options

Tennis Courts at 50th & Woodland Park Ave N: Eliminated due to conflicts with existing uses and trees & grading



Eliminated Options

Eliminated option that impacted BMX Jumps, Cross Country and Soap Box Derby





Current (Final) Options at Woodland Park



Tree Impacts: For Every 1 Removed, 3 Planted





Option A (Preferred)

- 10 trees impacted, so 30 new tree plantings
- 9 would be removed for certain 6 of those are > 24'
- 1 will require further study on impacts and may be retained
- Highly visible location
- Break up the line of trees
- Remove the visual separation between field and street

Option B

- 78 trees impacted, so **234 new tree plantings**
- 42 are large tree removals ≥24 inches
- 7 are large trees impacted ≥24 inches (may be removed more study required)
- 21 are smaller trees removed <24 inches
- 8 are smaller trees impacted <24 inches (may be removed more study required)

Potential Parking Impacts & Solutions



Option A: Lower Woodland Field #2 (Preferred)



Strengths

- Closest, walkable location for Lincoln; reduces bus use/emissions
- ❖ Uses existing multi-use field with lighting/utilities; cost-efficient
- Precision LED lighting reduces glare/spill; improves safety
- Tree stewardship: minimal removal; 3:1 planting
- North / South orientation better for competitive game play

Challenges


- Construction closure → schedule coordination, maintain park access around site
- Parking adjustments → increased need for parking
- **Path impacts** → replace with accessible routes in final design

Option A: Refining the Concept




- Minimize bleacher capacity; replace the row of trees along the east edge
- **Distribute bleachers** between two fields
- **Optimize the field footprint** where possible
- **Explore parking optimization**; opportunities on Green Lake Way
- **Canopy restoration**

Option A: Tree Planting Options



Option B: Parking Lot @ 50th & Aurora



Strengths

- Activates 50th & Aurora Corner
- Avoids disruption at Lower Woodland
- Community informed solution

Challenges

- Removes 130 existing parking spots
- Lighting impacts
- Removes 78 existing trees
- Requires significant grading / retention walls
- Reroutes current driving loop
- Significantly limits site mobility
- Significantly higher cost impacts than Option A

What We've Heard

Broad Community Input: Heard from a wide range of community groups, including the Lincoln High School community, the Scouts, cross-country teams, BMX riders, the Wallingford Park Alliance, and neighbors through emails, SPS Let's Talk, and online comments.

- Community Use: Strong preference for multi-use recreation over single-sport (e.g., football).
- Impacts: Concerns about tree loss, parking, traffic, and conflicts with existing park events.
- Equity: Split between improving access for Lincoln students and preserving open public space.
- Tone: Passionate but constructive, offering helpful design ideas.
